First and foremost, Joyce is dedicated to the academic success of her students in and outside the classroom. She has a reputation with students as being a “hard” instructor. In addition, I have worked with Joyce on two different campus committees: the Academic Misconduct committee and the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion committee. She regularly attends meetings, and is always prepared to contribute her perspective as a faculty member. I, and other committee members, have appreciated her thoughtfulness.

Finally, Joyce finds the time to engage with students in clubs and other non-academic opportunities. She currently advises both the Engineering Club and the Rock-Climbing Club. I know students find Joyce to be approachable and friendly, and many students have developed close connections with her through these extracurricular endeavors.
